## JEOPARDY GAME

### Origins of Pop Art

- **\$100:** This country is where Pop Art first emerged in the 1950s. ( Britain)
- **\$200:** The 1956 collage often cited as one of the earliest Pop Art works was created by this artist. (Richard Hamilton)
- **\$300:** Pop Art gained momentum in this country during the 1960s. ( the United States)
- **\$400:** Eduardo Paolozzi's works often critiqued this aspect of post-war society. (consumerism)
- **\$500:** The Pop Art movement emerged partly as a reaction against this earlier art style. (Abstract Expressionism)

### FAMOUS ARTISTS

- **\$100:** This artist's Campbell's Soup Cans are among the most famous examples of Pop Art. (Andy Warhol)
- **\$200:** Known for comic strip-inspired paintings, this artist created Whaam! in 1963. (Roy Lichtenstein)
- **\$300:** This British artist designed the cover of The Beatles' Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band. (Peter Blake)
- **\$400:** His soft sculptures often featured oversized food items like hamburgers. (Claes Oldenburg)
- **\$500:** This German artist used satire to critique post-war consumerism and American cultural dominance. (Sigmar Polke)

### ICONIC WORKS

- **\$100:** Marilyn Diptych by Andy Warhol features repetitions of this celebrity's image. (Marilyn Monroe)
- **\$200:** This artwork by Richard Hamilton critiques post-war consumer culture. (Just It That Makes Today's Homes So Different, So Appealing)
- **\$300:** Roy Lichtenstein's comic-inspired painting that shows an explosive aerial battle. (Whaam!)
- **\$400:** This Warhol piece turned a supermarket product into an icon of fine art. (Campbell's Soup Cans)
- **\$500:** Peter Blake's famous album cover featured cut-outs of celebrities and fictional characters. (Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band)

## Characteristics

- **\$100:** Pop Art often uses these colours, known for their bold and vibrant appearance. (bright colours)
- **\$200:** The movement blurred the line between high art and this. (popular culture)
- **\$300:** Pop Art often incorporates images from this type of media. (advertising)
- **\$400:** This art technique, popular in Pop Art, allowed for mass production of artworks. (silkscreen printing)
- **\$500:** Pop Art often uses humour and this technique to critique society. (irony)

## Design and Legacy

- **\$100:** This designer's 1966 collection featured dresses inspired by Pop Art. (Yves Saint Laurent)
- **\$200:** This chair by Verner Panton remains an iconic piece of Pop Art furniture. (the Panton Chair)
- **\$300:** This famous album cover is a quintessential example of Pop Art design. (Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band)
- **\$400:** This German movement blended Pop Art with critiques of capitalism. (Capitalist Realism)
- **\$500:** Pop Art paved the way for these contemporary art movements. (postmodernism and conceptual art)
